Comment on the Championships

"O wad some Power the giftie gie us To see oursels as ithers see us!"

Those who live north of the Waitaki River will be forgiven if they fail to attribute these lines to the Scottish Bard, Robert Burns. But the veriest Sassenach (a collective which includes the writer) will at least get the drift of the saying. And it is in an endeavour to show shooters how they appear to others at a National Championship that Gunshot presents its first signed editorial. There has been no split between the co-editors. It is just that championships are old stuff to Stewart, a brand new experience to Parry.

That the 1959 Championships were efficiently organised and controlled is no news to anyone who was there. Indeed, shooters probably take it for granted that there will be few hitches, and that any problems will be rapidly ironed out. To a stranger it was little short of miraculous that so many competitors could be so skilfully handled, so comprehensive a programme run according to schedule, with a minimum of harrying, badgering and hectoring.

It is easy to understand why shooters travel long distances and spend considerable sums in order to compete at such meetings. The trite old saying about the game being above the prize was perfectly true at Hamilton. Everyone tried to shoot his best, to win a national title or a trophy or a handicap event.

But the sportsmanship was remarkable, the spirit of good fellowship a delight to see, the congratulations of vanquished to victor always warm and sincere. The cheerful and friendly competition of club shooting was carried to top level at Hamilton, where the standard of sportsmanship was on a par with the shooting.

To win a major title must be a tremendous thrill, but it is also a never-to-be-forgotten experience simply to compete in the company of such skilled shots and determined but sporting rivals. The absence of bickering, the cheerful acceptance of misfortune, the happy sessions when tension was off and tongues were loosened—these were notable qualities of a notable event.

Those shooters who have been deterred from attending National Championships by the thought that they are not Streeters or Hartleys have missed a great deal. I found it one of the happiest weeks I have spent—and I didn't fire a single shot.

NORTH CANTERBURY CLUB HAS GROWN STEADILY

In spite of gaps in the records it is possible to piece together a good deal of the history of the North Canterbury Gun Club which has had, in its time, a number of members who made their mark as leading shooters and administrators.

The club was formed in 1914, a Mr. Dix being convener of the inaugural meeting. On his motion, which was seconded by Mr. A. Prestney, the club actually came into being. The first president was Mr. B. Edwards, the first secretary and treasurer Mr. H. H. McNelly.

Mr. Prestney is believed to be the only foundation member still living. Now a life member, he has been associated with club activities for 45 years. He served as a referee for about 30 years and was for a time a New Zealand referee. At the last annual meeting he was elected patron of the club.

In the early days most of the shooting was at live birds, clay pigeons being introduced only when the supply of live birds ran short. The first clay pigeon trap was presented to the club by Mr. J. Skilling, one of the best-known shooters in the Dominion. Mr. Skilling was president of the club for a number of years and his death in 1933 was a severe blow to the club. In his memory a shield was purchased (with the assistance of a grant from the Dominion Council) and it is still competed for each year.

Harking back to the original members of the club, names which come to mind are those of O. Nelmes, F. and H. Truscott, Dr. T. A. Will, G. Bruere and G. Rutherford, some of whom will be remembered by present-day shooters.

One of the best shots in the Rangiora district was "H. Price", whose name appears in the records as winner of the 1909 New Zealand Pigeon Championship. This was actually Harry Stone, who was elected a life member of the club in 1927, at which time he was one of the oldest shooters in the country.

BUILDINGS

During the latter years of the First World War the club got to work on a building programme.

Things were beginning to flourish and the annual club championships were decided by shooting at live pigeons, clay pigeons and sparrows, with a gold medal valued at £5 5s presented to the winner.

By 1920 the club had progressed to the stage of holding the New Zealand Pigeon Championships on its grounds, the winner being Mr. G. Bruere, an active member for many years and later club president.

It is of interest to note that in 1921, when Mr. Skilling became a life member, Mr. A. B. Kerr was elected vice-president. Now 82, Mr. Kerr is the father of the well-known shooter and official, L. W. Kerr.

In 1924 the club bought its first Western Clay trap capable of throwing double rise targets. The cost—£20! About this time, too, the practice of regularly meeting with sister clubs and arranging shooting dates so that there were no clashes was introduced. It has worked satisfactorily ever since.

By the end of 1925 the club had 146 members and, as it prospered, so were the grounds and buildings improved. In 1927 the first automatic angling trap was installed. A future New Zealand champion, D. W. Davison, appeared on the scene about this time. He was only 13 when he started shooting with the club.

The first-ever South Island Clay Pigeon Championships were conducted by North Canterbury in 1929 and that fine shot I. G. Watkins took the title for the next three years. He was later a South Island Council member.

SHOOTING DECLINE

Some stalwarts were lost in the next few years, including Mr. H. D. Bettger, who had been secretary for a considerable time. Shooting went into a decline, possibly as a result of the depression, and there was also difficulty in leasing suitable grounds. Eventually the club was successful in buying a property of its own and the club still stands on this site.

The New Zealand Championships were allocated to North Canterburv in 1940 but the war intervened and it was not until 1946 that this event took place. Entries constituted a record up to that time.

Improvements have continued to be made, and the club now has an up-to-date skeet field, three traps for down-the-line shooting, and a much improved pavilion.



"Her powers of concentration are terrific," he told Gunshot in an interview at the national championships. "She is a charming and delightfully natural 20-year-old, but when she is on the mark she completely shuts out everything else. When she is concentrating on her next shot she is oblivious to what is going on around her."

Peter Matheson, on his way to England to take delivery of a Viscount airliner for N.A.C., broke his journey at San Francisco and, through the good offices of George W. White, secretary of the National Skeet Shooting Association, met Mr. Allen, a leading light in the executive of the association and also a prominent shot.

Hospitality was magnificent. "I remember paying for a cup of coffee for myself," said Peter reflectively, "but it must have been an accident." He travelled by Cadillac and was wined and dined in extremely generous fashion throughout his stay.

On his first afternoon he was taken by Mr. Allen to two skeet clubs near San Francisco. Each had five or six skeet ranges superimposed on a similar number of downthe-line traps. They were not the

biggest in the United States, but were said to be typical. In the matter of traps and equipment they were first-class with rather more concrete than is usual on New Zealand fields, but the club houses were not at all elaborate.

Next afternoon Peter Matheson had his skeet rounds with Mr. Allen, Mr. McCabe and Judy, who is all-American lady champion. It was his first experience of shooting skeet with a .410 shotgun and he confessed to feeling a little overawed by the company, but managed to score one creditable 23 with a 12-gauge.

The fact that the .410 contains only half an ounce of shot and that it forms a very tight pattern makes it tougher shooting than with the 12-gauge usually used. Leading shots usually practice with the smaller gauge gun.

High Standard

The quality of targets and ammunition was similar to that in New Zealand and prices were comparable, he said. Most popular birds on the East Coast are White Flyers, while Eclipse is in use at many clubs on the West Coast.

"The standard over there is infinitely higher than in this country," said Peter Matheson, who reminded his interviewer that skeet shooting is controlled by a different body from that in charge of the administration of down-the-line trap shooting. There are, he said, about 6,000 skeet shooters in the States, about 60,000 trap shooters, and 6,000,000 shooters who take out some form of game licence each year.

One of the secrets of the high standard in the States is the amount of practice. Judy Allen will, during the off-season, shoot something like 15 rounds a week. This off-season lasts six months as the game season is of that duration and most clubs cease competitions during that period. The most popular guns used

are automatics, with a few underand-overs and a minority of pump

guns.

Interest is kindled and maintained by a wide variety of competitions. There are team shoots between teams of five as well as two, parent and child competitions, husband and wife contests and a whole gamut of junior, sub-junior, senior, sub-senior and other graded competitions.

It was as a result of what he learned from Mr. Allen about the enthusiasm for competition that Peter Matheson brought forward his remit at the annual meeting about the introduction of five-man team shoots in this country.

Automatic Traps

He also noted while he was away that the majority of traps are automatically loaded. This results in a slighter higher percentage of breakages but is generally considered to be well worth while.

American shooters are not quite so unconcerned about bad weather as our own and shoots are quite frequently cancelled because of inclement weather.

His stay in San Francisco had been made immensely enjoyable by the kindness of his American friends, said Peter Matheson and, if he had done nothing else it would have been worth while just to see a slim, small 20-year-old girl breaking targets with the utmost precision and skill.

Just to instance her ability he recalled that she and her father hold the parent-and-child record of 299 skeet targets out of 300. Judy broke a possible, her father dropped his last bird—and has been ribbed about it ever since!

In case her skill proves too depressing to New Zealanders reading about it, Peter Matheson mentions the fact that, quite apart from her great amount of practice shooting, Judy was spotted by a "talent scout" and had two years of concentrated professional coaching before she began to hit the headlines.

N.Z. Championships

Brilliant Shooting, Excellent Organisation

In spite of fog on the first morning and a period of heavy rain during the Skeet Championship, conditions were generally excellent for the 1959 National Trapshooting Championships conducted by the Hamilton Club between April 15 and April 22. Splendid organisation and facilities, a uniformly high standard of pulling, and the usual spirit of camaraderie among competitors made the championships an outstanding success.

There were many brilliant performances, none more so than the 300 point possible scored by popular shooter and official L. W. Kerr in the international sealed shoot.

J. C. Streeter, of Amberley, was the winner of the A. N. Turner Memorial Trophy for high gun in the three championship events, in the course of which he won both the Single Rise and Double Rise titles.

The Skeet title was taken by J. McKenzie (Seaward Downs) who made a dramatic second-round bid to win the championship.

South Island retained the interisland trophy and, indeed, southern shooters took all the top honours at the championships.



Dorreen started shooting Mr. back in 1913 on the grounds of the Christchurch Club. The targets were live pigeons and sparrows, there being no traps to throw clay targets.

His first shoot with clays was in Greer's paddock, at Harewood, about the same time. The Greers were well known for their association with the Styx Gun Club.

About 1919, Mr. Dorreen went to the United States. Following his return two years later he became associated with throughout Canterbury. Before associated with the becoming Dominion Council he was patron of

North Canterbury and president of both Belfast and Christchurch Clubs. A sportsman and a gentleman, Mr. Dorreen is a worthy choice as patron for he has the respect of every shooter he has met.

Mr. Glenn has also had a distinguished career as an administrator and competitor. For 20 years he has been president of the Hamilton Gun Club and for the past 10 years he has been New Zealand president.

Never a man to ask others to do what he would not do himself, he has been an exceptionally devoted worker for the good of the sport sparing neither time nor money in his efforts to promote and improve shooting in New Zealand.

Statistics of the type of guns used at the Hamilton National Championships this year make interesting reading. Of the 191 guns checked in the single rise championships there were 95 under and overs, 38 side by side and 58 automatics. The check of 150 guns in the major handicap of the tournament showed 70 under and overs, 25 side by side and 50 automatics.

Many North Islanders at Hamilton wanted the national championships as early in the year as possible, in the better weather and in good time before the duck shooting season. South Island farmers wanted them as late as possible because of the pressure of work earlier in the year. Said one of them, amidst laughter: "Make the championships early and the North Islanders will win championships galore. We won't be there to oppose them."

After months of perfect weather the Belfast Gun Club was unfortunate to suffer bad shooting conditions when the 1959 South Island Clay Target Shooting Championships commenced at Belfast on March 13. Rain squalls and a strong south west wind tossed the targets about at awkward angles. In spite of the inclement weather, entries received for each event were high. All provinces in the South Island were represented by their leading trap shooters and there was a small Wellington contingent.

The South Island Skeet Championship proved an excellent win for the well known Southland shot A. J. C. Donald (Otahuti). As the last competitor out of a field of 57, Donald realised that he had to break a possible to take the major honours as six previous shooters had already registered 24 out of a possible 25.

Showing excellent shooting temperament Donald performed this task in spite of his gun malfunctioning several times. Although he was runner-up in the National Single Rise Championship at Hamilton in 1957 this title was his first Island success.

S. R. Marston (Christchurch), T. A. Everett (Christchurch), A. R. Kingsbury (Timaru), D. S. Harrison (Methven), J. F. McPherson (Cheviot), and S. W. 

 - (a) N.Z. Single Rise Clay Target Championship and
 - (b) The two qualifying rounds of the Mackintosh International Teams Match.
- 2. Points to be awarded according to the rules governing these matches respectively.

3. In the event of a tie the tie-ist who scores the greater number of points in the Mackintosh Trophy International Teams Match will be declared the winner. Remaining tie-ists will shoot off in matches of five birds each under Mackintosh Team Match rules until the winner is found.

4. The Cup will be handed in at the next succeeding N.Z. Championships meeting when an engraved tankard will be presented to the Cup holder for his permanent keeping.

5. The Cup was presented by the Luigi Franchi Arms Company of Italy and the Empire Trading Company of N.Z. Limited, to the N.Z. Gun Clubs' Association and is the Association's absolute property.

6. The Cup will be engraved each year with the name and score of the winner.

7. The Tankard will be presented each year by the Empire Trading Company of New Zealand Limited.



A Few Hints For Beginners

By Capt. F. J. ALLEN.

I expect a good many of the younger generation are interested in shooting with the shotgun. If so, perhaps a few hints from an old hand may be useful to them.

First of all I would warn them about buying a gun. All guns are now very high-priced, so it is essential to get the best value they posmade by any of the well-known makers and give a lot of money for it, and then find that they shoot badly with it, for it is not the price given for the gun which makes a good shot.

I strongly advise them to go to someone experienced in trying and fitting guns. This can be done at a very reasonable price, and will make all the difference to their shooting, even if they are already fairly good shots.

Some years ago a friend showed me a very nice high-priced gun which he had bought and asked me to try it out at clay pigeons. On picking up the gun I told him I did not think I could shoot with it, as it did not fit me at all well. He said: "If you are a good shot, you ought to shoot with this, as it is one of the best you can buy." I tried it out on some clay pigeons and only smashed two out of 20.

So he offered to shoot a match with me for £10. I said I would take him on if I shot with my own gun, which I had been fitted for. A few days later I took my gun and smashed 19 out of 20 and won his

VERY DIFFERENT

Gun shooting is very different to shooting with a rifle. You have not time to take careful aim along the barrel through sights as with the rifle; in fact, the gun should come up on the object shot at without aiming along the barrel at all, which it will do if it has been properly

There have been a lot of letters to the sporting Press in England about aiming ahead of birds crossing at right-angles or thereabouts, so I do not want to say anything very definite about this, but in my opinion it all depends on swing. Personally I do not aim in front of any bird, and I think it all depends if, when you have swung on to the bird, you stop for a second or two and press the trigger whilst you are still swinging.

Just to pop up the gun and take an aim feet or even yards in front is, in my opinion, fatal to good shooting. A fast bird coming straight towards you low down is very often missed; here, again, I find that to swing on to the head and keep swinging until the bird just disappears under the barrels and pull when still swinging is the best way for this difficult shot.

GUN SAFETY

Before finishing this little lecture for the young, I should like to give a few warnings about carrying a gun. Do not carry it in the crook of the arm, with the muzzle raking all your neighbours right and left, and when carrying it on the shoulder, keep the trigger-guard upwards so that the slope of the barrel points upwards, not down-wards, where it is likely to blow somebody's head off.

You cannot beat carrying it with the barrels pointing to the ground, a few feet in front of you; in this position it is quite safe and can be very quickly got to the shoulder. When getting through a hedge or over a fence, it is best to unload and not trust to the safety-catch being at safe.

The annual general meeting of the New Zealand Gun Clubs' Association (Inc.), was held in the Wintergarden, Hamilton, at 8 p.m. on Monday, April 20. Mr. T. M. Glenn presided.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year as the result of the postal ballot held amongst all affiliated clubs:-

President, Mr. T. M. Glenn (Waikato); North Island Vice-president, Mr. S. D. Perry (Huntly); South Island Vice-president, Mr. W. R. Brinsley (Dunedin); North Island Executive, Messrs. C. Darrall (Morrinsville), P. A. Matheson (Wellington), J. R. Russek (Whangarei), B. W. Williams (Hastings), J. Wright (Marton).

South Island Executive: Messrs. E. F. Bearman (Christchurch), Allan Brown (Lauder), T. W. Elliott (Balcutha), D. S. Harrison (Methven), L. W. Kerr (Rangiora).

North Island Referees: Messrs. R. G. Brader (Huntly), W. B. Cattanach (Wellington), A. D. Meaney (Morrinsville), R. C. Morris (Masterton), H. B. Newman (Hastings), I. Sutherland (Palmerston North).

South Island Referees: Messrs. E. G. Amyes (Dunsandel), C. Booker (Christchurch), L. J. Eden (Motukurara), D. N. Elliott (Balclutha), L. W. Kerr (Rangiora), W. J. Leask (Lauder).

Auditor: Mr. H. T. Weir (Dunedin). Allocation of 1960 N.Z. Championships and International Match: Applications for all Championships were received from the Christchurch and Timaru Gun Clubs and as a result of a ballot, the 1960 New Zealand Championships and International Match were allocated to Christchurch. The voting was as follows: Christchurch, 256; Timaru, 99.

Remits:

Amberley Gun Club: That the system of voting for Association Executive Officers and Referees be modelled on exact lines to a General Election vote, enabling every registered member to cast his own vote.

Christchurch Gun Club: That all Provincial Championships to be open to those shooters residing within the Province ONLY. (Lost)

Ellesmere Gun Club: That shooters should be issued with some form of Receipt when paying nominations at N.Z. Championship meetings.

(Carried)

Hutt Valley Gun Club: That the N.Z. Gun Clubs Association consider the introduction of Skeet teams Championships in New Zealand in accordance with the procedure followed in the U.S.A. Teams to consist of two men and five men units. Such teams championships to be run concurrently with the present N.Z. Skeet Championships. A feature of such team championships is that it is not necessary for a team to shoot in the same squad unless desired. (Carried)

That the N.Z. Gun Clubs consider the introduction of a Skeet Championship in 410 gauge as an interesting variant of the present 12 gauge championship. (Lost)

That the referee at the N.Z. Championship meeting shall be a referee of the Association and that the Official Referees officiate at the N.Z. Single Rise, Double Rise and Skeet Championships. (Carried)

That the Official Referees of the Association shall officiate at all Island, District and Provincial Cham-

That the N.Z. Gun Clubs Champion-ships be completed before the end of March each year. (Lost)

That for the assistance of Secretaries of Gun Clubs holding Open Shoots and Championships that the names and clubs of all registered shooters be published at regular intervals in "Gunshot". (Lost)

That Sweepstakes be made compulsory for the Single Rise, Double Rise and Skeet Championship in New Zealand and Island Championships

Methven Gun Club: In voting for Referees and the Executive all Clubs must vote for the full number re-quired in each case. (Carried)

Morrinsville Gun Club: That the Executive nominate a committee to bring down an official handicapping system for Skeet. (Carried)

That if a gun malfunctions a shooter must not open his gun until the referee has examined it. Otherwise a bird shall be declared lost. (Carried)

North Canterbury Gun Club: That the Council of the N.Z. Gun Club: Association consider the introduction of a panel of Junior Referees in addition to the 12 official referees elected by the vote of Clubs as at present. It is suggested that Clubs could forward the names of any persons considered competent, these men would be expected to act at open shoots when required, for at least 12 months, the Council to have power to appoint a limited number of approved persons at an Annual Meeting of the Association.

Timaru Gun Club. That in view of the introduction of five traps for N.Z. championships the panel of referees in both Islands be increased.

(Carried) Waihora Gun Club: That all straight clay shoots be entered on the Handi-cap certificate with the exception of Christmas shoots and Club Champion-ships. (Lost)

That Clubs vote for no more and no less than the number required for Island Referees and Island Executives, otherwise their vote to be declared invalid. (Withdrawn)

Registration, Affiliation Fees.

The 1958-59 registration and affiliation year expires on June 30, 1959, and dues for the coming year, commencing July 1, 1959, should be paid on or before that date. The annual registration fee per member is £1 and the club affiliation fee is £1 is. Clubs will appreciate that it is an immense task issuing approximately 2 200 registask issuing approximately 2,200 registration certificates, so it would be helpful if club's remittances could be

sent soon. Please ensure that a list of members, in ALPHABETICAL ORDER, showing full addresses of members to be registered, are sent with registration fees. It would help considerably if lists could be typed or printed clearly. Full postal addresses are absolutely necessary to ensure certain delivery of registration certificates and copies of Gunshot.

Grading of Clubs: The following clubs have been regraded as shown: North Island, Taumaranui, Grade C; Rangitikei, Grade D. South Island, Maniototo, Grade D; Tisbury, Grade D. Several North Island clubs have received provisional gradings, subject to inspection when improvements have been carried out.

Standard Grading: The following standard of grading has been laid down. Clubs whose facilities do not measure up to the standard will have until April 1960 to make the neces-sary improvements in order to retain their present grading.

N.Z. Championship Standard: At least four concrete traphouses and concrete lanes with automatic traps; laid out on level ground with clear background, two Skeet fields with electric traps etc. A Pavilion to include Secretary's Office, N.Z. Secretary's Office, N.Z. Secretary's Office, N.Z. President's Room. Luncheon room atached, to seat at least 70 at one time, with ample kitchen facilities to cope. Large area of standing room for spectators out of rain and able to view shooting. Refreshment bar of adequate size if licence procurable and to have hot water etc., to comply with health regulations. Toilet facilities to include two water lavatories for Gents etc., and one for Ladies; both conveniences to have basin with running water. Ample car parking space on ground. Accommodation of good class in city within 12 miles radius. Telephone and electric power laid to ground.

Island Championship Standard: At

Island Championship Standard: At least two concrete traphouses and concrete lanes with automatic traps; laid out on level ground with suitable background. One Skeet field with electric traps etc. Pavilion to include Secretary's Office and room for Island Secretary. Luncheon room attached to seat at least 45 at one time and kitchen facilities to suit. Adequate standing room for spectators out of rain and able to view shooting. Refreshment bar on ground if licence procurable and to have hot water etc., to comply with health regulations. Toilet facilities to include two hygenic lavatories etc., for Gents and one for Ladies, both to also include basin with running water. Ample car parking space on ground. Accommodation available within 20 miles.

Provincial Championships: At least Provincial Championships: At least two concrete traphouses and concrete lanes with automatic traps laid down on level ground. A third trap on hand in case of major breakdown. One Skeet field with electric traps etc. Secretary's office with standing room out of rain available for shooters. Luncheon facilities available to seat at least 30 at one time. Toilet facilities of hygenic requirements for Ladies and Gents. Parking for cars on ground. Hotel accommodation within 20 miles. Refreshment bar not essential but if installed to comply with health regulations.

Open Shoots: At least two automatic traps with tracks laid out on level ground with good footing. Secretary's office and room for shooters to stand out of rain. Catering of morning and afternoon teand adequate luncheon provided under cover. Toilet facilities for Ladies and Gents in good order. Ladies and Gents in good order.

Club Shoot: Safe shooting conditions re safety of boy in trap etc.

Note: Each Club conducting a N.Z. Island or Provincial Championship must have a spare down the line trap and skeet trap available in case of breakdown.

Skeet Rules: In the past the Association has used the rules of the National Skeet Shooting Association ciation has used the rules of the National Skeet Shooting Association of America as a guide, any amendments by the American Association having to be approved by the Council having to be approved by the Council before coming into force in N.Z. In future, the American Association rules will be accepted without the necessity of confirmation by the Council. As amendments are received from the United States, the information will be passed on to clubs.

"Gunshot": "Gunshot" is now the official program of the N.Y. Cun

official magazine of the N.Z. Gun Clubs' Association Inc.

Fast or Slow Pull: The present by-law under this heading reads: "A shooter may refuse a target when the shot trap is time of time before or after the word time before or after the word 'pull', or where the trap is pulled without any call of 'pull', but if he fires, the target must be deemed accepted and he must abide by the result, the referee still having power to declare a 'Lost Bird' if in his opinion it was not a genuine fast or slow pull."

An interpretation of this by-law is as follows:—"If a shooter does receive a slow pull but still fires at the target, he cannot be given another target even if the referee deems it a slow pull."

Malfunction of Gun in Skeet Shooting: (Ref. Page 51 of 1957 Rule Book—Section 4) Interpretation of this by-law reads: "The failure of the automatic gun to load a second cartridge is to be deemed a malfunction in skeet shooting." This interpretation has been referred to the National Skeet Shooting Association for confirmation. Meantime the ruling above must be accepted. must be accepted.

Open Shoots of Ungraded Grounds: Permission will not be granted in future to Clubs to conduct Open Shoots on grounds other than the club's own shooting grounds unless such alternate grounds have been graded as suitable for open shoots.

Official Referees: As from 1960 there will be eight official referees for each island.

Hawkes Bay Central Shield: Condition 4 applying to the Hawkes Bay Central Shield Provincial Teams match, has been altered to allow each team to shoot as a squad.

Allocation of 1960 Championships: 1960 Island and Provincial Championships were allocated by the Island Executives as follows: (Each Club will conduct the Single Rise, Double Rise and Skeet Championships named).

North Island, Huntly: Auckland Provincial, Auckland; North Island West Coast, Ohingaiti; Hawkes Bay Provincial, Hawkes Bay Central; Wel-lington Provincial, Palmerston North.

South Island, Southland; borough Provincial, Marlborough; Westland Provincial, Kokatahi; Canterbury Provincial, North Canterbury; Otago/Southland Provincial, Nightcaps.

briefly during World War II to help British Intelligence perpetrate a successful hoax.

Inn Of The Sixth Happiness: Epic achievements of heroic missionary Ingrid Bergman in China. Beautifully photographed, with Robert Donat playing his last role.

Separate Tables: Rattigan's twopart play skilfully adapted and effectively acted out in slightly shabby English hotel setting. Themes of boozy loneliness and spinsterish frustration not solved by pat ending.

South Pacific: Enchanting widescreen version of famous musical beautifully filmed in Hawaii, translating story of American nurse and French planter into fresh and sparkling movie.

Rally Round The Flag Boys: Comic film on the thesis that a civic-minded housewife's place is in the home. Lots of slapstick, lots of laughs.

Perfect Furlough: Sometimes funny, sometimes silly, occasionally leering farce about GI who wins army-sponsored holiday with movie star in Paris.

NOVEL TYPE OF LIPSTICK

A cosmetic firm has dreamt up a new idea in the way of lipsticks. It is going to be fun to use—though it may take a little time to acquire the art.

Murray Pratt Can Still Break Clays

His face may be a little lined, his hands gnarled, but the eye of 72-year-old Murray Pratt is as clear as ever—and he was definitely one of the personalities at the New Zealand Championships. Although muscular trouble in his right shoulder prevents him from taking a very active part in shooting nowadays he took his gun to Hamilton, and, in one or two sweepstakes, showed that much of his old skill is still with him.

It is exactly 40 years since Mr. Pratt began shooting at Otorohanga where he still lives and he had his first competitive shoot in 1921. He is the only survivor of the original membership of the Hamilton Gun Club which was formed in 1920.

His first championship success was in 1929 when he won a club title, but four years earlier he had been runner-up to H. J. Nitz, of Masterton, in the New Zealand Clays at Marton. And in 1930 he took the Dominion Pigeons titlethe first of six national titles he was to gain in his distinguished shooting career.

In 1931 he won the N.Z. Clays at Hamilton, and in 1933 he scored a possible in the national Sparrows event. He took the title in a shootoff which went to eight further targets. Two years later he did exactly the same thing, right down to the number of targets in the shoot-off, and in 1946 at Rangiora he showed that eight was his lucky number, again winning the Sparrows at the eighth round. He won his last title in 1950 when he again took the Pigeons championship.

During all those years of competitive shooting he won a total of 31 important championships and had it not been for his shoulder trouble might have added more to his bag. And he watched the fields grow and grow until now twice as many competitors are entering for championship events.

Mr. Pratt thinks the standard of shooting today is really high and he has the utmost admiration for the shooting of latter-day topliners. But he makes a few quiet reservations.

"The targets were thrown further by at least 10 or 15 yards a few years ago," he told Gunshot. "Undoubtedly this makes shooting easier than it used to be. And I am sure the ammunition is better than it used to be."

"Nevertheless, this is not at all a bad thing. Because the shooting is easier than it was there are more shooters. I feel sure half the shooters today would not be competing if things were as difficult as they used



to be. The more we have in, the better for the sport."

Mr. Pratt has been a genuine allrounder. In his younger days he won many chopping events and he was also a prominent bowler, taking the Waikato Champion of Champions title on one occasion.

However, it is as a shooter that he is honoured in this edition of the shooters' own magazine. He has taken a lot out of the sport but he has also put a great deal in. Murray Pratt's name will always be recorded in the annals of trap shooting and be remembered as the name of a true sportsman.

Every tournament has to have a tale that goes the rounds. One that was rapidly passed around at Hamilton concerned a woman who went to see her doctor to say how worried she was because Grandpa, who was 91, had started chasing girls.

"Don't you worry about it," said the doctor. "I've had a dog that has chased cars all his life and I often wonder what he would do if he caught one" caught one.'




